### **NEWS FROM OUR FACULTIES**

## **English**

In English, we have settled into the new school year and made a brilliant start to learning after the summer holidays.

Year 7 have been learning all about the History of Language, exploring novels such as 'Utopia' by Thomas More and 'Robinson Crusoe' by Daniel Defoe.

Year 8 have started reading 'The Time Machine' and investigating technology and the advantages and disadvantages of this.

Year 9 are currently reading 'To Kill A Mockingbird' and are contributing excellent ideas on unit's theme of prejudice, courage and good vs. evil. There have been some very interesting conversations surrounding Boo Radley's character and the prejudice he suffers in particular.



In Key Stage 4, Year 10 have started their GCSE study with Macbeth, whilst Year 11 have been revising their GCSE English Literature texts and starting their Language content. We are very pleased with how both Year 10 and Year 11 have settled into GCSE study and are working hard to achieve in the coming months. Well done, everyone!

### **Maths**

We've had a great start to the academic year. We've loved welcoming our groups into our newly relocated classrooms in the maths building. The energy has been calm but full of intrigue and excitement for the wonders of mathematics. In addition, we've had the pleasure of welcoming Mr Brown to the team. He has enjoyed getting to know his classes and exposing them to new mathematical concepts.

We are busy preparing for Year 11 mocks after the half-term. The students have been prepared with their revision lists and have been revising during lessons. We will be working with Year 11 over the next few terms to ensure revision outside of school is productive and that they have opportunities to attend revision sessions for areas that they are weaker in.

This term, we have launched a coding club open to Years 7 through to 10 in which the students compete against hundreds of schools across the country in the National Cipher Challenge. The students have enjoyed cracking the codes using the Ceaser Cipher Wheel and the Linear Scrambler. These were famously used by Roman Emperor Julius Caesar to communicate top-secret information with his army generals. We are looking forward to the students doing very well in the challenge and placing Iceni at the top of the leaderboard!

### **Science**

We have launched the ambassadors scheme with year 7 and chosen eight from lots of very good entries.



Decorating club have been making the decorations for open evening and our Halloween event on the 22nd October.

We have had some excellent Key Stage 3 science homework projects!



What a term! The PE department has come alive again with almost all covid restrictions now lifted. The nicest thing to have back is clubs and fixtures. We are extremely proud to say we managed to create 180 opportunities to represent the Academy this half term. We are prouder to say, that around 150 different students took that opportunity: that is creeping towards a quarter of the school. Well done to all of those who represented us in Football, Netball, and Rugby.

Next half term already has Football, Basketball and Cross-Country in the diary. Students will also be representing their community in PE lessons when they take on the Cross-country challenges. I must also take this opportunity to say thank you to my PE team and volunteers (Mr Boyd, Mrs Warren and Mr Charlesworth) for giving up so much of their time to create these experiences for our students.

### **Humanities**

It has been a busy half term in the faculty, welcoming the new year seven and getting off to a flying start with all year groups. In History, we have prepared year seven for their study of the Battle of Hastings, year eight are investigating the Tudors and year nine are exploring the full horrors of the Great War. Simultaneously, year ten made an outstanding start to the GCSE course with Medicine Through Time, whilst the Year Elevens are focused up on their upcoming mock examinations. We are very much hoping that, after the COVID induced hiatus of two years, our Battlefields trip will be back this summer. Watch this space.

Geography students have been embedding their geographical skills in year seven, including finding their way around an OS map. Year eight are examining the impact of rivers on the environment, whilst year nine have really enjoyed their cross discipline geographical study of Japan. GCSE students in both years ten and eleven have got off to a fine start and we are hoping to initiate some exciting educational visits in the near future.

Students in Key Stage Three RE have enjoyed learning about comparative religions and their differing approaches to a range of ethical scenarios, such as war, marriage and worship. We are also eagerly anticipating our first Diwali Day, many thanks to both Miss Pyke and Miss Griggs for their organisation of such an exciting event.





### **Design Technology**

In Computing we have been looking at how technology has evolved over the years and how artificial intelligence could become more common in our daily lives. There have been some really interesting Year 8 discussions on this topic with students questioning what jobs will be available to them in the future and wondering how Miss Bhadrinath coped without music and internet on her phone when she was in school.

With the news this week that Tesco has opened their first store without checkouts, students can predict how the future of technology will unfold. By 2040 a lot of the jobs that people do today will be able to be conducted by artificial intelligence and some of the jobs our students will have when they are older do not even exist yet. This has led students to question how they can ensure they have the right qualifications when they leave school to be able to work alongside technology.

We are currently living in the "information age" and it is believed that we are subjected to 174 newspapers worth of information every day. A shocking statistic to our students.

### **MFL**

Yr11 Speaking Mock Exams:

Year 11 MFL students are gearing up towards their mock exams and we have been preparing tasks for their speaking exam. All students have been given a list of questions on their chosen theme and a photocard task to prepare. Their subject teacher will be conducting the speaking exams and will ask them questions from the work they have already prepared. They will need to be able to respond to those questions with confidence and without any notes.

Before going into the exam they will be given 6 minutes preparation time, with an invigilator present, they can use this time to go over their notes.

Thursday 11th November: French & Spanish

Monday 22nd November: German

Teachers will confirm times with the students in their classes.
