Our affiliation with fellow ATT academy, The Nicholas Hamond Academy (TNHA) in Swaffham, continues to provide an excellent opportunity for our pupils to be involved in extra-curricular sport. This half term, saw pupils from TNHA come to us for fixtures in netball and football. Some excellent games were played, and we look forward to visiting TNHA after half term for dodgeball fixtures in Years 7, 8 and 9.

As we head into the colder months, please ensure pupils are equipped for outdoor lessons. Some activities are suitable to go ahead this time of year. Others will be paused for a lesson during inclement weather and an alternative activity will be undertaken. Iceni branded PE items or a non-branded plain navy alternative are appropriate for lessons. Socks should be Iceni PE socks or white sports socks (although I wouldn't recommend white at this time of year!) It is also a good idea for pupils to being in a plastic carrier bag to place wet/muddy trainers/boots in after their lessons.

A gentle reminder that all jewellery, including retainers, must be removed for lessons: this includes new piercings. We cannot allow piercings to be taped up in lessons under AfPE guidelines and therefore pupils will be expected to remove them. Please encourage pupils to wait until July 2026 for new piercings. Technology

At Iceni Secondary Academy we run three Technology Clubs after school from 3.15pm to 5.00pm for our Years 7, 8,and 9 students, with the aim to inspire and teach them a wide range of practical skills not possible through the normal curriculum. Our Year 9s are now working on a soap box project with the aim of entering the Hunstanton Soapbox Run 2026. Projects over the first two years of the club have ranged from carpentry and cabinet making, metal work, bricklaying, to fitting and constructing machines and electronics, with students taking home chairs, tables, metal work tools and working machines made to college standards.

By the time they end Y8 they will be able to work independently, and this year's Year 8 club were asked for ideas for a final project for the summer half term. By consensus they suggested doing something for the community and formed three groups to produce a garden bench for three different local organisations; Blue Bell Community Pub in Stoke Ferry, Duchy of Lancaster School in Methwold and Cupola Farm and glamping site.

Our students designed each bench for their specific chosen charity and are very proud of benches they have made. We are looking forward to presenting these to their choice organisations shortly at a private ceremony.



PSHE

As part of our ongoing commitment to Personal, Social, Health and Economic (PSHE) Education, our Year 7 and Year 8 students recently took part in a powerful alcohol awareness session delivered by the Smashed Project — a national programme designed to educate young people about the dangers of underage drinking through live performance and interactive discussion.

The Smashed Project takes a unique approach to alcohol education. Rather than using scare tactics or lectures, the programme uses live drama and open conversation to spark honest thinking about the realities and consequences of underage drinking. The project is delivered in partnership with schools across the UK and globally, and is supported by educators and safeguarding experts.

During the session, students watched a live, professionally acted performance that followed a group of teenagers navigating peer pressure, alcohol use, and the consequences of risky choices. The story was intentionally realistic and relatable, helping students connect emotionally to the characters and scenarios.

Throughout the performance, students were encouraged to reflect, ask questions, and engage in meaningful discussions led by the actors. This format helped them explore issues such as:

- The short- and long-term risks of underage drinking
- The impact of peer pressure and how to handle it
- How choices made under the influence can affect health, safety, relationships, and the future

This session is part of a wider PSHE programme at school that supports students in making informed, confident choices about their health and well-being. In the coming weeks, we will be following up in class discussions, helping to reinforce key learning points.

I want to take a moment to recognise just how proud we were of our students throughout the session. They showed real maturity, listened respectfully, asked thoughtful questions, and contributed sensitively to the discussions. Their behaviour and engagement were outstanding, and they truly embodied our core school values:

- * Aim High by showing curiosity and a willingness to learn about important reallife issues
- 6 Work Hard by staying focused and engaged throughout the session
- Be Kind by supporting one another and showing empathy during challenging conversations

It's moments like these that remind us what a fantastic community of learners we have!





Humanities

It's been a successful start of the year for the humanities department with students engaging well across the board. The new Year 7 intake have made a brilliant start in history, learning about how Britain changed from the Iron Age up to the Norman Conquest. In geography, Year 8 have made excellent progress in understanding the process of globalization.
