This week, I have particularly enjoyed speaking to students across the academy about their learning. From a Year 8 student who enthusiastically explained electromagnets with impressive accuracy, to a Year 7 Geography class exploring how geographical factors shape communities, to a Year 10 discussing the Ghost of Christmas Present's role in Scrooge's transformation, it has been a pleasure to see how much students remember and how deeply they think. I have also spoken with many Year 11 students about their mock exam responses. These conversations remind me just how thoughtful, capable, and passionate our students are.

That enthusiasm for learning is also represented in our Seneca statistics. We end this half term - as we so often do! - at the top of our Trust's Seneca leaderboard! Collaboratively this year so far our students have completed a staggering 3,805 hours of Seneca study which they should be immensely proud of. Our commitment to our value "Work Hard" really shines through in our Seneca statistics!

Year 11 have been amazing throughout our mock exam window, and we're excited to see their results when they are published after the half term break. We've also been very impressed with our Year 7 and Year 8 students who have been completing the first ever Academy Transformation Trust shared assessments in English, maths, science, history, geography and French. These assessments allow us to see how well our students have learned the curriculum we share with the other academies in our organisation, as well as how well our students have performed compared to similar peers across the Trust.

It has been another successful half term for our house competitions. Over 200,000 recognition points have been issued this half term alone, reflecting the positive attitudes and achievements of our students. The race for the Recognition Club is being very closely contested, with just a few points separating the top three houses; however, Dyson are currently just ahead at this stage of the term. Next half term will also see our second sports house competition, which all students will have the opportunity to take part in.

As has quickly become an Iceni tradition this year, we finished the half term with the Knowledge Cup, delivered in the style of Who Wants to Be a Millionaire? This was a fantastic event that showcased students' knowledge, confidence, and enthusiasm.



Personal Development Week Launch

This half term has also seen the launch of our Personal Development Week. During this week, Year 10 students will take part in a full week of work experience, while students in Years 7–9 will explore and select their subject pathways. This is a valuable opportunity for students to explore learning beyond the classroom and gain insight into the world of work, and we are really excited to be offering this experience. Lines in the sand

We continue to make clear and positive progress as a school. To further support this progress and ensure we maintain the highest expectations for success, we will be making two amendments to our “lines in the sand” next half term, based on school data.

Firstly, unfortunately, our environment is increasingly being affected by chewing gum. We have a very clear expectation that chewing gum is not allowed in school; however, we have not previously issued sanctions for this. Despite repeated reminders, this issue has continued and impacts the cleanliness of our environment which is not nice for all our students. To support a positive and clean school for all, any student caught chewing gum will now be issued a T2 break time detention, and will be required to remove it immediately. We will continue to be clear with our expectations.

Secondly, while punctuality has significantly improved over the past 18 months, we continue to strive for further improvement. We have already taken steps to support this, including increased staff presence on corridors, clear access to timetables, and tutor time sessions. However, we are still seeing too much learning time lost due to lateness. For example, last week alone, 22 hours of lesson time were lost. This is not fair on those students who arrive on time, as it disrupts their learning. Students are also missing out on vital learning opportunities.

To further support punctuality, we will be reducing the threshold for after-school detention. This currently sits at 40 minutes of accumulated lateness over the week and will be reduced to 30 minutes. We hope this will further support students in arriving on time to lessons and help reinforce punctuality as an important life skill.

Together we achieve more

Thank you once again for your continued partnership and support. We are proud of the progress being made by our students and look forward to continually building on this positive momentum as we move into the next half term.

Rewards

Pupils continue to track their success through their **Personal Record of Achievement (PRA)**, which gives pupils a weekly opportunity to reflect on their achievements and set clear targets for the week ahead.

As it stands, we are very proud of our pupils:

540 pupils achieved a **Bronze Certificate** (500+ points)

507 pupils achieved a **Silver Certificate** (750+ points)

449 pupils achieved a **Gold Certificate** (1000+ points)

272 pupils achieved a **Platinum Certificate** (1500+ points)



These figures reflect the outstanding effort, conduct and commitment shown by our pupils across the school year. Determination to reach these goals has been so excellent from pupils, we have had to introduce DOUBLE and TRIPLE Platinum for 3000 and 4500 points respectively.

Last term concluded with Year Group Success Assemblies, and if pupils were absent to collect these certificates, they should see their Head of Year directly if they have not done so already. The next batch of certificates will be given out at the Easter Success Assembly as well as:

Subject Awards – voted for by subject departments to recognise excellence

Work Hard, Aim High, Be Kind Awards – voted for by Year Teams to celebrate pupils who consistently demonstrate our school values

Personal and Form Attendance Awards – recognising strong attendance

Form Positive Points Award – awarded to the form with the highest number of positive points


We're very much looking forward to working with Year 9 on the next step of their very exciting journey.







PE

Happy New Year! It doesn't seem long ago that we last wrote in the Christmas newsletter, and here we are, in February already!

KS3 pupils have been kept busy in their PE lessons since Christmas with a variety of activities including, dance, fitness, basketball, table tennis, football, volleyball and badminton. In addition to these activities, we trialled a Leadership unit in KS3 with Year 8 and 9 pupils gaining their first experiences of how to be an effective leader. It was an absolute pleasure witnessing first hand, and hearing about the number of pupils who stepped up and showed their true colours when it came to practicing their skills. They were able to develop their communication and whistle skills, their knowledge of what an effective session should include and practice delivering elements to increase their confidence levels. This range of skills will serve them well both in and out of sport, and we look forward to working with more pupils over the course of the year. Well done to all involved!

Our Cambridge National pupils continue to work hard across their exam and Sport and the Media units, ensuring that they push themselves into the best position come the final exam and coursework entries. KS4 pupils have continued to apply themselves well in core lessons with great attitudes and effort levels. It is always great to work alongside the older pupils, who now use their PE lessons so well as a valuable tool in balancing the stresses and strains of an examination-heavy timetable.

The highlight of this half term in PE has got to have been our OAA unit, where pupils in years 7-10 have been working hard across their respective pathways to complete several orienteering and team building challenges. Activities have ranged from treasure hunts, photo orienteering, 4 and 6 figure grid referencing, blindfold challenges and team building games with pupils competing against each other to complete routes first or find the best strategies to complete tasks most effectively. Pupil's observational skills were tested in our newest course, Photo Star orienteering, where Year 10 pupils had to combine their knowledge of Star Orienteering and Photo orienteering from previous years on order to solve the course first. Clues such as the one to the right were used by pupils, who got their steps in, hunting around the academy grounds for correct answers. It is always lovely to see pupils rise to the challenge in these OAA lessons, the same pupils who we maybe don't see such confidence levels from in the more traditional PE activities such as netball and football. Well done to all involved!

Our affiliation with fellow ATT academy, The Nicholas Hamond Academy (TNHA), Swaffham, continues to provide an excellent opportunity for our pupils to be involved in extra-curricular sport. This half term, saw us visit TNHA for dodgeball fixtures in Years 7, 8 and 9. There have been some excellent performances, and it is a real joy to see so many pupils getting involved in these matches. Next half term, we have more of these fixtures with the sport changing to girls football and rugby.

As the weather continues to be wet and muddy, please ensure pupils are equipped for outdoor lessons. Some activities are suitable to go ahead this time of year. Others will be paused for a lesson during inclement weather, and an alternative activity will be undertaken. Iceni branded PE items, or a non-branded plain navy alternative are appropriate for lessons. Socks should be Iceni PE socks or white sports socks. It is also a good idea for pupils to bring in a plastic carrier bag to place wet/muddy trainers/boots in after their lessons. Thank you for your continued support when washing and drying muddy kit! We really do appreciate your support in ensuring that pupils have what they need to participate in lessons. A gentle reminder that all jewellery, including retainers, must be removed for lessons, and this includes new piercings. We cannot allow piercings to be taped up in lessons under AfPE guidelines and therefore pupils will be expected to remove them. Please encourage pupils to wait until July 2026 for new piercings. Thank you for your support with this.

Enjoy the February half term. It is always a welcome one, after the hustle and bustle of the Christmas holidays. I hope you find a chance to enjoy some time outdoors to search for the ever-increasing signs of Spring. The sun won't set until 7.30pm by the end of March. This half term in English, each year group has been getting to grips with a different text, and there has been a real buzz across the department. Year 7 are enjoying their introduction to detective fiction through Conan Doyle's *The Speckled Band*, exploring mystery conventions, learning how to track clues, and beginning to build confidence with Victorian language. Year 8 are fully immersed in *Blood Brothers*, engaging with its themes of class, superstition, and family, while developing their understanding of how a script works on stage and on the page.

Over in Year 9, students are taking on Shakespeare's *Richard III* and growing steadily more confident with the language. They have been discussing what makes Richard such a compelling villain and how Shakespeare shapes audience reactions through soliloquies and dramatic irony. Year 10 continue their journey through Dickens' *A Christmas Carol*, working carefully through each stave and focusing on how Dickens builds Scrooge's transformation. They are also producing increasingly thoughtful analytical paragraphs as they prepare for next year's exams.

Finally, Year 11 are deep in the world of revision and mock preparation. They are consolidating key knowledge across both Language and Literature, revisiting exam skills, and strengthening their ability to plan and structure responses under time pressure. This week sees Year 11 completing their last ever GCSE Mock Exams in preparation for the real thing in only a few months!



Design Technology




